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

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

2022 was a remarkable year filled with various challenges and opportunities, none which would have been possible without the unwavering support of our donors and supporters, who have enabled us to assist the vulnerable amidst chaos and conflict.

This year, we significantly expanded our emergency response efforts, swiftly providing aid during natural

disasters in Pakistan, the Horn of Africa and Indonesia, and ongoing assistance in Gaza, Afghanistan, Lebanon, Yemen and for Syrian refugees, working tirelessly to improve livelihood facilities and community resilience.

We also joined in the call with other Australian NGOs to facilitate the safe return of Australian citizens, including children and their mothers, from northeast Syria, advocating for their repatriation back home.

Furthermore, we successfully completed several development programs, including WASH initiatives in Bangladesh and livelihood projects in the Philippines. We also continued a long-term community-based health project in Afghanistan and initiated the establishment of a health clinic in Jordan.

As a member of the Islamic Relief Worldwide family, we were also able to reach over 428,433 individuals worldwide. Among them, 83,018 people benefited from our sustainable development projects, while 229,384 individuals were reached through emergency responses in 11 countries.

Our seasonal and faith-inspired giving made a positive impact on 18,563 people across 16 countries during Ramadan, 81,250 people in 18 countries during Dhul Hijjah,

and 10,038 people in 9 countries through our winter program. Additionally, we provided support to 1,300 orphans in 23 countries.

Here in Australia, we reached 4,880 people in need, contributing to disaster resilience and community support. We collaborated with UNICEF Australia to deliver relief in flood-affected areas and continued our community development initiatives with numerous local organisations and communities.



HOW WE WORK

As Islamic Relief Australia we work with our supporters and partners to prioritise the countries and needs that we want to support, but it is through being part of Islamic Relief Worldwide that we are able to put our global plans into action.

The Islamic Relief family offers our supporters and partners the opportunity to reach across the world with the assurance that our work is carried out to the highest professional standards.

We assist people according to need and do not expect anything in return, and do not discriminate in any way, regardless of faith, race, class, disability, gender or political affiliation.

We have made clear commitments to further the **United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)**. In all projects and interventions that we support. We strive to ensure environmental sustainability, social justice and access to fundamental needs, including adequate food, personal safety and safe drinking water. This holistic approach contributes towards achieving the SDGs and **addresses the interconnected issues of poverty, inequality and injustice** through innovative programs, overseas and on the ground in Australia.

Rooted in our Islamic faith, we are often able to work in areas where other organisations may struggle to get access

and we provide assistance that is culturally appropriate and in line with the community's faith and beliefs. We work with communities in determining what assistance is needed and how that is delivered, giving them a clear voice in the design and delivery of our programs and policies. **We have embedded the principle of 'do no harm' in everything that we do,** ensuring that our staff and volunteers abide by a strict code of conduct, that child protection, safeguarding and measures to prevent sexual exploitation and abuse are in place, and that there are accessible complaints procedures.

Our ability to **raise funds** and resources on a global scale



Our efforts in connecting the world through humanitarian relief



means that we can **respond** on a global scale. **In 2022 the IRW family collected and raised nearly AUD \$445.5 million, reaching 17.3 million people in 40 countries, a significant resource that can be deployed to assist those in need.** We have an Emergency Fund that is available for rapid release, this enables us to respond immediately to emergencies and not wait for funds to be collected or applied for. This rapid response capacity, coupled with our global reach, is the reason why often we are among the first organisations on the ground.

We have committed ourselves to meeting various practice related **compliance standards**. The standards include those set by the Australian Council

for International Development (ACFID) in Australia and the Core Humanitarian Standard (CHS) globally. We are also signatories to various commitments, including the Leave No One Behind UN Agenda and the Red Cross Code of Conduct.

By committing to these standards, we are able to measure ourselves against **best practice** in the sector. We are also able to assure our supporters that we maintain the highest standards of accountability, transparency, and professionalism.

The certification also facilitates our access to significant funding from various governments, global bodies and private philanthropy institutions. The **various peak bodies regularly**

audit our systems and procedures to ensure that we are maintaining the appropriate standards.

We will continue to embed **monitoring, evaluation, accountability and learning (MEAL) across our programs.**

An effective MEAL program supports good feed-back loops, this means that we grow as an organisation and are consistently informed by our frontline staff and volunteers, listening to their insights and experiences from working in the communities they serve. Our MEAL program assists us in investing in developing ever-more **rigorous accountability and governance systems** that maximise the benefits we deliver with the contributions of our donors.

AFGHANISTAN



In Afghanistan, multiple crises have resulted in a dire humanitarian situation. Over 23 million people face hunger, with 9 million on the brink of famine.

Grappling with the aftermath of COVID-19 and the effects of drought, earthquakes, decades of conflict and the impact of international sanctions on its government, Afghanistan's economy and social infrastructure are struggling to cope. More than half of the population is in need of humanitarian aid and the situation is rapidly deteriorating.

OUR RESPONSE

While many organisations have been unable to continue work in Afghanistan, Islamic Relief has been able to remain on the ground, reaching those in need. Our strong presence in Afghanistan has allowed the team to operate throughout the crises, and respond with lifesaving humanitarian aid to the most vulnerable households.

Among many other projects, including our HIRA project (pg. 42), Islamic Relief continues to deliver a strong emergency response to tackle food insecurity in Afghanistan.

During the current crisis, Islamic Relief Australia (through its collaboration with other Islamic Relief member organisations) has helped distribute a total of 848 food packages in the Balkh province. This response ensured that the nutritional requirements of 5,936 people were met every month in one of the most vulnerable regions in Afghanistan.

Our initiatives also assisted refugees fleeing Afghanistan. Partnering with Australia for UNHCR, Islamic Relief Australia provided essential support to vulnerable Afghan communities in neighbouring countries. This assistance included distributing multipurpose cash grants, as well as life-saving care and protection.

Both methods of assistance were beneficial in enabling vulnerable families to fulfil and prioritise their needs. Combined, the project assisted 2,146 households and approximately 10,730 people.

SARWAR'S STORY

"I am sure families like us won't survive and at least half of the population of Afghanistan is like me and my family."

Sarwar found himself in a dire situation. Unable to secure a job, he had no means to provide for his family. To make matters worse, he had to sell his inherited property just to put food on the table. Money from the sale was dwindling, leaving them at risk of hunger and starvation.

Amid this hardship, Islamic Relief came to Sarwar's aid, providing him and his family with a vital food package that sustained them for a month and a half.

The timely support not only met their immediate needs but also restored hope and resilience, reminding Sarwar's family that he was not alone in his struggle and offering a lifeline during challenging times.

PAKISTAN



In Pakistan, climate-induced floods have left a devastating impact on at least 33 million people, destroying homes and livelihoods.

Climate change, social vulnerability and high rates of poverty mean that Pakistan faces significant challenges in handling natural disasters. With 70% of the population exposed to a range of natural hazards and the looming threat of areas becoming uninhabitable due to extreme temperatures, floods, droughts and coastal erosion, millions of people are at risk.

In total, our efforts helped over 2,800 million people throughout Pakistan, providing essentials such as shelter, water tanks, latrines and other necessities. These aid efforts also included distributing 18,545 multi-purpose cash grants, 14,361 food packs, 48,000L of clean drinking water and 10,379 hygiene kits.

Islamic Relief will remain committed to helping communities in Pakistan recover from the impact of floods. We will also address the country's vulnerability to climate change, through implementing climate-sensitive projects with a focus on sustainable water management, incorporating innovative approaches like water recycling, drip irrigation and solar-powered pumps.

By integrating innovation and research into our interventions, we strive to ensure environmental sustainability and contribute to the long-term climate change resilience and adaptability of Pakistan and its people.

THE 2022 FLOODS

The floods and other natural hazards caused by the 2022 monsoon season, in particular, have wreaked havoc on communities in provinces like Balochistan, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Punjab and Sindh, damaging infrastructure, displacing families and leaving them vulnerable to waterborne diseases.


Islamic Relief has been working in Pakistan since 1992 and was one of the first aid agencies to respond to the initial flooding. During the crisis, Islamic Relief Australia focused on providing immediate relief to

SOMALIA



Somalia is grappling with an exceptionally severe, multi-season drought - the most intense in over four decades - triggered by insufficient rainfall..

Across the Horn of Africa, in Somalia, Kenya and Ethiopia, a catastrophic climatic event has caused significant devastation to livelihoods and sharp increases in food, water and nutrition insecurity. In the hardest-hit areas of Somalia, where families are completely reliant on their livestock, one out of three has died since mid-2021, and tens of thousands of people are malnourished and forcibly displaced.

OUR RESPONSE

Baidoa, located in the South West region of Somalia, is facing numerous challenges due to an influx of internally displaced persons (IDPs) escaping unpredictable weather conditions and armed conflicts from neighbouring districts and regions.

To address this crisis, Islamic Relief launched an emergency response project - BIDER - in the Baidoa region. Working with our partner, The Charitable Foundation, we are saving lives, reducing hunger, improving food security, and enhancing the nutritional well-being of the most vulnerable populations.

Islamic Relief Australia, in collaboration with Islamic Relief Somalia, is providing timely and critical interventions, distributing 3 months of food packages to 320 households within Baidoa IDP camps, ensuring access to nutrition education and adequate, nutritious food for those in need.

The project reached a total of 1,920 individuals and aims to expand the response to other drought-affected families in Baidoa IDP camps who have yet to receive food aid.

Our commitment goes beyond the BIDER project, as Islamic Relief is providing comprehensive support across Somalia, addressing critical needs beyond immediate food relief. We prioritise vital cash assistance

for families to access local food, enhance water supplies for long-term food security, and establish dedicated nutrition clinics to combat malnutrition, especially in young children.

The famine in the Horn of Africa is in danger of becoming a forgotten crisis. Only 66% of the required aid is being delivered, while the number of people requiring assistance has doubled. In addition to the obvious immediate needs, there is a need establish foundations that enable communities to build greater resilience going forward. Our overarching goal is to empower drought-affected populations by not only delivering emergency relief but also creating sustainable livelihood opportunities for a brighter future.

LEBANON

Lebanon is currently grappling with a worsening economic crisis, resulting in severe shortages of food, medication and other essentials.

Islamic Relief has had a long history of serving those in need in Lebanon, helping communities rebuild their lives through numerous programs and providing emergency assistance, including in the distribution of medicine.

Through partnerships we delivered

The high cost of medication poses significant challenges, particularly for individuals with chronic conditions who struggle to access the essential drugs they need to manage their health effectively. The essential medication included painkillers, antibiotics, penicillin, antiepileptics, and various chronic conditions such as diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure, mental health, gastric ulcers, and hypothyroidism.

Partnering with the Islamic Medical Association (IMA), Islamic Relief assisted in distributing vital medicine, donated by Pharmacy 4 Less Altona North, to 3,121 individuals in need.

We thank our community for your generosity towards the people of Lebanon and their ongoing support to long-term recovery.

Indonesia

Indonesia's unique geographical position makes it vulnerable to volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, floods and tsunamis, and in 2022, the West Java earthquake left the local community devastated.

More than 2 million people across the districts of Cianjur, Bogor, Bandung, Sukabumi, & Jakarta were affected by the earthquake. With approximately 73,874 people displaced, over 300 deaths and 2,000 injuries, urgent humanitarian intervention was needed.

Despite landslides and blocked roads hampering rescue efforts, Islamic Relief quickly provided on-the-ground support to assist displaced families. Working with local partners, we distributed emergency shelter, hygiene kits and essential items such as food, water, and blankets to 2080 people.

Islamic Relief is also providing post-emergency support through Early Recovery Activities. This will include the provision of temporary shelters, temporary schools, emergency livelihood programs and water sanitation initiatives, as well as assisting in rubble-clearing efforts.

YEMEN

Delivering emergency health aid to a Yemeni hospital



Yemen's humanitarian crisis remains the world's worst, driven by conflict, disease, and economic collapse.

Millions of people in Yemen are hungry, destitute, fighting disease and are acutely vulnerable. Conflict and economic instability have resulted in tens of thousands of deaths and over 20 million people struggling with food insecurity. An alarming 80% of Yemen's population urgently requires humanitarian aid, making it the highest rate in the world.

Islamic Relief is actively working to combat the ongoing crisis, delivering assistance on the ground and working with a significant number of partners on various sustainable development projects in Yemen.

One of our interventions, the Emergency Nutrition Response Project, focused on supporting acutely malnourished children, pregnant women and lactating women. By the end of 2021, estimations were that 3.4 million children under five and pregnant/lactating women would be affected by Acute Malnutrition, with 400,000 facing Severe Acute Malnutrition. We are reducing the

prevalence of acute malnutrition and halt its further spread among vulnerable population groups.

The project was implemented in 154 Health Facilities across targeted governorates such as Hodeida, Raymah, Amran, Sada'a and Dhamar. It included training medical staff, setting up response systems, providing medication and equipment, offering counselling services and distributing a substantial number of nutrition packs. With this focused effort, we directly supported and improved the lives of 3,357 people.

We are also delivering emergency food assistance in the Amant Al-Asemah and Aden Governorates. In this project we are aiding 976 households (approximately 6,832 individuals) of the most vulnerable households with basic food assistance. In addition we are assisting 374 orphan families to take advantage of local economic opportunities to generate sustainable livelihoods. This initiative will reach approximately 2,618 individuals.

Among our other health initiatives, Islamic Relief continues to help combat the devastating cholera epidemic in Yemen, which remains the largest in modern history. We partnered with our offices in Germany, USA and the Netherlands, to reduce the high mortality and morbidity rates associated with cholera and its complications. Through clinical and hospital support, as well as the distribution of cholera care kits, we currently give ongoing assistance to 13,230 acute diarrhoea patients.

Over 8.4 million people in Nigeria's poorest region urgently require humanitarian assistance, as they grapple with extreme poverty, hunger and displacement.

The majority of the population in North-East Nigeria live in extreme poverty, with over half suffering from malnutrition. The activities of non-state armed groups (NSAG) have worsened the situation, disrupting economic growth and social development and forcibly displacing thousands of families.

distributing essential relief items such as dignity kits for women and girls, agricultural, livestock and fishery kits, and business start-up kits for entrepreneurs. We are thereby able to deliver livelihood activities that strengthen the capacity of IDPs to build sustainable livelihoods and meet the needs of their families.

We recognise the importance of self-employment in conflict and post-conflict settings, as it empowers victims of insurgency by providing a safety net and enabling them to meet their own needs. Our projects support the growth of agricultural enterprises and small businesses. We focus on youth enterprise development and vocational training opportunities. These initiatives help enhance self-reliance and restore the dignity of IDP families.

OUR RESPONSE

In partnership with Australia for UNHCR, Islamic Relief Australia provided comprehensive and timely multi-sector assistance and protection interventions for Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in Nigeria. This initiative addresses the pressing challenges faced by the IDPs, particularly the lack of livelihood opportunities, the prevalence of negative coping mechanisms and weak family resilience.

PALESTINE



Ongoing violence and the aftermath of a global pandemic, coupled with decades of occupation and the blockade, have resulted in political instability, escalating social challenges, and constraining economic development across Palestine, making challenges even worse.

Palestine is a cause that is dear to the heart of Islamic Relief and our supporters. Since we began our work in Gaza in 1997, we have had a strong commitment to providing humanitarian services in the region.

We are aiding in the reconstruction of

We have been assisting those impacted by the conflict and aiding in the reconstruction of homes, schools and clinics.

However, our work is not over yet. The humanitarian needs of people in Gaza are extensive. With 80% of the population relying on external aid to survive, 53% of the population below the poverty line, 70% of people under the age of 30 unemployed, 68% not knowing where their next meal is coming from and 20,000 orphans, our efforts must continue in order to rebuild livelihoods.

We thank the community for responding with immense generosity and kindness and for continuing to show that the people of Palestine remain close to our hearts as a high priority.

AL HADI: ENSURING FOOD SECURITY

For vulnerable populations in remote, conflict-afflicted or disaster-stricken regions, a number of logistical constraints make it difficult for them to receive frozen meat.

In the world's poorest and most devastated areas, many households lack access to the refrigeration and storage needed to preserve the frozen meat distributed to them, leaving them little choice but to consume it all in one meal, in order to avoid spoilage or waste.

NON-PERISHABLE MEAT

To address these challenges, Islamic Relief, in partnership with the Islamic Development Bank (IsDB), created the Al Hadi Project. Through this project, Islamic Relief Australia will distribute non-perishable meat to 140,000 people in two countries whose unique circumstances leave their populations in pressing need for food assistance.

Amidst conflict and natural disaster affecting these two countries, the project aims to reduce food insecurity and improve the overall nutritional health of the populations.

WINTER SUPPORT

Every year, the harsh winter conditions have a direct impact on many of our rightsholders as escalating energy and food prices push more people into poverty.

In response, Islamic Relief's winter campaigns play a crucial role by providing them with essential supplies, including blankets, food, and fuel, ensuring they are kept warm and protected.

In 2022, our winter appeal reached vulnerable populations in Afghanistan, Bangladesh (providing assistance to the local population and Rohingya refugees), Nepal, Pakistan, Syrian refugees, Turkey and Yemen.

Through these focused projects, Islamic Relief Australia was able to assist a total of 10,038 people.

SCALE: SUSTAINING COMMUNITY LED ENTERPRISES

Islamic Relief Australia's SCALE intervention continues its work to empower vulnerable communities in Mindanao (the Philippines).

This poverty alleviation and livelihood project supports 10 villages across 5 municipalities in the province of Maguindanao with a focus on vulnerable women, youth and indigenous people.

Through the establishment of agricultural-based enterprises across the region, the project aims to provide sustainable livelihoods, support peace initiatives and create local female leadership within the community.

These objectives have been achieved through the establishment of 4 cooperatives in Bangsamoro, each with a specific focus and aim of uplifting the community socially and economically while accelerating peace-keeping efforts, contributing to diplomacy, community cohesion and the strengthening of community ties.

WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE (WASH)

Islamic Relief Australia's water and sanitation campaign - 'Water for Life' - acknowledges the life saving and life giving properties of water and its centrality in supporting human life.

Our water and sanitation projects thus supply essential aid in both emergency and long-term contexts that enable community access to sustainable sources of clean water

In Bangladesh, one of the most densely populated countries in South Asia, access to clean drinking water remains a major challenge for the majority of the population.

Our Work in Bangladesh

In Bangladesh, the majority of the population rely on shallow tube-wells as their main source of water.

However, the challenges of inadequate sanitation, poor hygiene practices and groundwater issues, such as arsenic contamination and high iron content, have a significant impact on public health.

Additionally, flooding worsens the situation by damaging wells, while underserved areas face difficulties in accessing affordable solutions for improved water supply.

In partnership with Islamic Relief Bangladesh, Islamic Relief Australia launched a WASH Program (Water, Sanitation and Hygiene), which aims to provide safe drinking water to vulnerable communities in Bangladesh.

The project involves installing Deep Tube-Wells (DTW) and Shallow Tube-Wells

(STW) in Derai Upazila of Sumangonj District and Jamalpur Sadar Upazila of the Jamalpur District. It also includes training caretakers for ongoing repair and maintenance, as well as facilitating hygiene promotion sessions for WASH-vulnerable families.

The goal of this project is to ensure safe drinking water for all and promote improved health, nutrition and hygiene practices, thereby reducing morbidity and mortality rates, particularly among children in Bangladesh.



JORDAN HEALTH CLINIC

The healthcare sector in Jordan is facing growing pressure as the number of refugees and vulnerable individuals in the country continues to increase.

The increasing number of refugees, primarily from Syria, and the impact of COVID-19 have placed mounting pressure on Jordan's already struggling healthcare sector. With a host community that also requires additional healthcare services due to population growth, changing demographics and the rising prevalence of non-communicable diseases, sustaining the demand for healthcare remains a challenge.

Around one-third of the Jordanian population lacks health insurance, and vulnerable groups, including women, children, disabled individuals, war-wounded individuals, patients with mental health conditions and older refugees, require affordable and long-term healthcare services.

Health Clinic in Al Mafrq aiming to improve the health of vulnerable and marginalised people in Jordan

Our Work in Jordan

To address this need, Islamic Relief is working with the Jordanian Ministry of Health, UNHCR and local community-based organisations to provide primary health care services for refugees and host communities in Al-Mafrq. The intervention will improve the health of 2,000 of the most vulnerable and marginalised people.

The permanent clinic will provide primary healthcare services, including -



Clinic Operating System Registrations



Treatments and Consultations (including vital sign checks and other medical assessments)



Referrals for surgeries in other IRJ health projects or other health agencies.



Medications and education on the use of medications



Conduct supportive activities with high-quality service (such as free specialised medical days, volunteer doctors, etc.) in partnership with other iNGOs or CBOs.

HIRA AFGHANISTAN: COMMUNITY BASED HEALTH CARE

Decades of conflict and instability have left thousands in Afghanistan struggling to meet their basic needs, including adequate medical care, as the nation's healthcare sector is straining to meet the growing demand.

Project aiming to assist:

Our Work in Afghanistan

To relieve the strain on Afghanistan's overwhelmed health sector, Islamic Relief Australia continues to deliver assistance through our community-based healthcare project, known as HIRA, which focuses on assisting the most vulnerable community members – mothers, children and the youth. Islamic Relief Australia is a long term supporter of the project, we are committed to providing long term solutions to long term challenges. The benefits of providing appropriate and sustained healthcare will continue for generations to come.

This primary health care project delivers:

- Antenatal and postnatal care for mothers;
- Nutrition support and psycho-social counselling for pregnant women;
- Improved nutritional levels for children under five;
- Intensive health support for severely and acutely malnourished children; and,
- Learning and self-development opportunities for young people.

SYRIAN REFUGEES: PRIMARY HEALTH CARE CENTRE

Syrian refugees have endured eleven devastating years of war, tragically losing their homes, livelihoods and their loved ones.

Prolonged crisis has left 14.6 million Syrians in need of humanitarian assistance with increased shortages of food, medicine and fuel. Some 90% of the population are living below the poverty line and almost 2.4 million children are out of school, with many more facing barriers to accessing safe and stable educational opportunities. We have so far provided:

5 Health Care Centres **30,000** people with drugs, disposables, baby food

Our Efforts

In the ongoing crisis, Islamic Relief has been dedicated to providing continuing life-saving aid, including delivering vital healthcare support to almost 1.3 million people.

Primary Health Care Centres are at the frontline of health care provision, providing critical care for the significant number of displaced Syrians who are struggling to survive in camps.

Islamic Relief Australia has provided support to five Primary Health Care Centres, which provide direct services to the displaced Syrian populations. We are assisting 30,000 people, through providing essential drugs, disposables, baby food and medical supplies.

Building on our work to date, our future focus in the region will be on reducing the impact of chronic diseases, childhood and seasonal diseases and improving reproductive health through the provision of antibiotics, painkillers, antipyretics and decongestants.

Additionally, Islamic Relief Australia will provide intensive care drugs, oxygen tubes and paediatric incubators necessary for patients in intensive care.

EMPOWERING CHILDREN THROUGH EARLY CHILD DEVELOPMENT

Islamic Relief Australia focuses on Early Childhood Development (ECD) as a vital part of our healthcare interventions, recognising its interconnectedness with our broader aid efforts and the overall wellbeing of society.

In order to achieve these goals we work in close partnership with UNICEF Australia, a leading organisation in child-focused development projects. Together, we share a common mission and strive to implement high impact projects in the Asia Pacific region.

Our joint interventions target children in their early years (birth to age 5), addressing health, nutrition, inadequate healthcare and limited cognitive stimulation to prevent long-lasting effects into adulthood.

ECD in Cambodia

In Cambodia, we are focussing on assisting 21,987 children under five and 2,853 community members and service providers in health, nutrition and early childhood education.

Our project focuses on capacity-building, ensuring quality ECD interventions and community coordination for sustainable Integrated Early Childhood Development (IECD) services. Through our partnership with UNICEF Australia in Cambodia we are supporting 53,723 rightsholders, providing multidisciplinary outcomes for impoverished communities.

ECD in Solomon Islands

ECD interventions are crucial in the rural areas of the Solomon Islands, where 87% of the population reside, and 14.3% are under 5 years old. As is common in many countries, the rural population experiences higher levels of poverty and overall disadvantage. Our project in Guadalcanal Province strengthens frontline ECD workers in education, health, and child protection, aiming to reach 60% of the 18,000 children under 5 years of age.

We collaborate with stakeholders, including child protection providers, social welfare services, police, health and education sectors, area health centres and rural health clinics, to address domestic violence and enhance the capacity of social welfare officers and teachers within the region.

Newborn Care in Vanuatu

Vanuatu's unique geography makes the delivery of infrastructure and services challenging, there are 80 islands and the terrain is very mountainous. For example, access to potable water is limited. Compared to urban areas, rural regions lack access to basic services, healthcare, education and economic opportunities; reducing the quality of care for women and children. Alarming statistics show that malnutrition contributes to over 45% of under-five deaths.

Our UNICEF Australia-Islamic Relief partnership is strengthening the health system, providing quality services, enhancing caregiver knowledge and skills, and promoting recommended health practices.

FAITH INSPIRED PROJECTS

Ramadan and Qurban

Each year, the Islamic Relief family joins forces to deliver the largest Islamic inspired food program, providing vital support to vulnerable people around the world during Ramadan and Dhul Hijjah.

In Ramadan 2022, Islamic Relief Australia delivered **3,375 nutritious food packs to 18,563 people in 16 countries**. These packs are carefully selected from local markets and aim to cater for specific cultural and local requirements.

In Dhul Hijjah 2022, Islamic Relief Australia delivered **3,250 Qurbanis to over 81,250 people in 18 countries** during Eid Al Adha celebrations.

Wherever possible, our food projects are integrated with our humanitarian development programs, enabling us to reach families of sponsored orphans or those supported by our livelihoods projects.

We also aim to empower local communities by sourcing products for our food distribution from local suppliers, and engaging with local communities to ensure fair and unbiased distribution practices.

At Islamic Relief Australia we support these initiatives that bring the broader community together and provide an opportunity for the Muslim community to express their generosity and inclusiveness.

In our "Help at Home" Programs we are working with a number of Mosque communities to provide social support that is responsive to community needs. We are supporting The House of Guidance in Tasmania, the Garden City Mosque in Toowoomba, the Al Nawawi Centre in Sydney and Werribee Islamic Centre in Melbourne to achieve their goals of creating a better world. Together we have delivered activities focused on domestic violence, support for refugees, youth programs, cross-cultural learning, disaster preparedness, and poverty and homelessness.

The Melbourne Grand Mosque community in Victoria has established the Werribee Islamic Centre, which provides facilities to the broader community. The Centre currently includes sporting facilities, childcare and a community hall. Future plans include additional sporting and education facilities, a library, and hospitality functions. The Werribee Islamic Centre has been established in Tarneit, a multicultural and multi-faith suburb in Melbourne.

In Sydney we are working with the Al Nawawi Centre. Inspired by the rich intellectual tradition of Islam, it strives to provide hope, unity and long-lasting benefits to Muslims in Sydney, across Australia and to the broader community as a whole. Through this collaboration, we aim to create a positive impact by supporting the establishment and initiatives of Al Nawawi Centre, working hand in hand to uplift the community and provide opportunities for personal development, education and spiritual enrichment.

RESPONDING TO EMERGENCIES AT HOME



Devastation caused by the NSW floods in 2022

In 2022, Australia experienced devastating floods, leaving many individuals and communities in financial and emotional distress. Vulnerable groups were disproportionately affected, facing additional challenges on top of their existing limitations in mobility, work and income opportunities.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS FOR NEW ARRIVALS

Islamic Relief believes in empowering and protecting communities during times of crisis. We understand the importance of providing comprehensive support to diverse groups, especially for refugees and new migrants to Australia.

Through our partnership with the NSW Government's Community Resilience Innovation Program (CRIP), Islamic Relief Australia has implemented a program that equips marginalised communities

with the necessary tools for navigating local emergencies, from initial response to long-term recovery.

Our initiative focuses on fostering resilience and self-sufficiency, ensuring individuals have the knowledge and resources to effectively respond to and recover from disasters. By addressing the unique challenges faced by these communities, we empower them to face emergencies with confidence and rebuild their lives.

RESPONDING TO THE FLOODS WITH UNICEF AUSTRALIA

In 2022 there were catastrophic floods that wreaked havoc on homes and livelihoods across Australia.

Catastrophic floods and severe weather have caused devastation and destruction across Australia, leading to loss of life and having a profound impact on communities. The Central West region of New South Wales, particularly Forbes and Dubbo, faced severe flooding, resulting in the largest flood operation in the state's history.

Islamic Relief Australia collaborated with UNICEF Australia to provide vital support to the region, delivering immediate relief packages to affected individuals. These packages included vouchers that could be used for essentials such as fuel, groceries, furniture, clothing, and household items. Our efforts encompassed food relief, shelter, clothing, household items, well-being support, and provisions for pets and animals.

DISASTER RISK REDUCTION

Australia is becoming increasingly prone to extreme weather events driven by climate change, and this will have a profound impact on children and families.

Australian disaster response capability, particularly in the form of our emergency services, are among the best in the world. However, we also need to ensure that everyday Australians are prepared for and are resilient to cope with disasters. This means that all voices are heard and all needs are recognised and accommodated. Islamic Relief Australia is supporting an important initiative by UNICEF Australia to address the need for meaningful inclusion of children and young people in policy making on climate change and disaster responses.

Children and young people are particularly impacted by disasters and are key to the response, recovery and resilience-building in our communities. UNICEF Australia's work with children has revealed that their needs and experiences are often hidden and misunderstood during times of disaster and crisis. Climate change-driven disasters can significantly affect children's lives, including their education, employment, and overall well-being, particularly for those in rural and remote areas already facing geographical disadvantages. Islamic Relief Australia will support UNICEF Australia in undertaking research and advocacy work, to ensure that there is long-term, sustainable change that prioritises the welfare of children.

In Australia we have built important relationships with communities, community-based organisations, implementing partners and government. Our work with these local organisations involves assisting these organisations to grow through raising funds, promoting their efforts, building their capacity and expanding their reach. We are often inspired by the enthusiasm and commitment of the staff and volunteers of the organisations we work with; Australia is blessed with a strong tradition of volunteerism and altruism.

In Yemen, for example, we work with a significant number of partners, including the World Food Programme, United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the Yemen Humanitarian Fund, Catholic Relief Services, Global Affairs Canada, Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (SIDA) and other generous government and private development institutions from across the globe. This allowed us to crowd over USD \$72 million in funds into helping to relieve the suffering in Yemen in 2021. As one of the UN World Food Programme's biggest partners, Islamic Relief provides essential support to over 2.5 million people in Yemen every month.

In 2022, our total income amounted to \$8.72 million, reflecting a notable growth of 29.4% compared to the previous year. Our primary

source of income was community support, contributing \$6.19 million, followed by in-kind donations totalling \$2.49 million.


As a result to the growth in income, our expenditure has increased to \$9.17 million from \$6.29 million in previous year representing a 46% growth.

The significant increase in expenditure can be primarily attributed to the rise in International and Local Program implementation, which rose from \$4.65 million in 2021 to \$7.60 million in 2022, representing a significant 63% increase. This substantial increase in Program implementation, underscores our unwavering commitment to fulfilling our mission, delivering donors gifts in a timely manner and serving the communities we are dedicated to.



In 2022, fundraising and community education expenditure amounted to \$1.08 million, reflecting a 7% increase compared to the previous year. This investment signifies our continuous efforts to expand our fundraising activities and enhance community education initiatives. Our goal is to foster long-term income growth and community engagement, ultimately taking your donations further and ensuring income growth in future years.

Furthermore, our expenditure on accountability and administration experienced a significant decrease of 22%, declining from \$0.62 million in 2021 to \$0.48 million in 2022. This reduction exemplifies our commitment to maximizing the impact of each dollar spent and underscores our focus on efficiency and accountability in our operations.

EXPENDITURE IN 2022


